Nitrates And Hay

Ranchers were looking at this summer beginning in May with some trepidation, we were short on any type of forages and the prospects of producing extra appeared slim. With the beginnings of rains and the accumulation of soil moisture, producers that planted in anticipation of moisture are now haying these sudans, millets and other similar hays. With these forage crops potential situations can arise, what is done now can have effects on cattle this winter. Nitrates in sudan, sorghums and millet plants are one of those situations. Producers are an optimistic group about any type of rainfall, so this spring many fertilized and planted crops in anticipation of forage production. The situation now is the plants were fertilized, have grown and been baled for hay. Nitrate poisoning has the potential to show up in this hay.

Nitrates are the primary form of nitrogen in most soils. When it is taken up by a plant, it is usually dispersed throughout the plant quickly, leaving low concentrations in the tissue. That is until some type

of environmental stress occurs such as heat and dry conditions. The accumulation of nitrates is triggered because plant growth is restricted, but uptake of nitrates continues.

Nitrates in these situations accumulate in the stalks of plants and when cut for hay stay in the stalks. Forages can be checked to show if nitrates are present in the plants. A quick test here in the office can show if nitrates are present, it cannot tell exact levels, but will let us know if the sample should be tested for exact levels. If that is the case then a forage sample can be sent to the Oklahoma State University soils lab for an exact reading for nitrates. This nitrate test which cost \$6 is a very inexpensive way to determine if there are nitrate issues with the hay. I believe it would be preferable to know now versus finding cattle dead this winter after consuming hay.

What cattle producers want to avoid, is having cattle to ingest large amounts of nitrates through the forage. In a short explanation, once nitrates get into the system, chemical processes take place which block oxygen transport to the body tissues and the animal dies of a lack of oxygen. Symptoms such as a staggering gait, labored breathing, or rapid pulse are generally followed by collapse, anytime from 1/2 to 4 hours after ingestion.
