Gundy & Stoops Mentoring Initiative

Head football coaches Mike Gundy of Oklahoma State University and Bob Stoops of the University of Oklahoma are teaming up with the Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence through its Boren Mentoring Initiative to host the Oklahoma Coaches' Mentoring Challenge, a statewide campaign to recruit mentors for young people in need.

The Coaches' Mentoring Challenge started in 2008 as a friendly competition between mentoring advocates Coach Tom Osborne of the University of Nebraska and Coach Bill Snyder at Kansas State University. Since then, 15 current and retired coaches from Big 12 and Big Ten teams have joined the challenge. This year, the Big 12 Conference has also endorsed the campaign, which runs Aug. 1 through Nov. 30. Last year's campaign rallied nearly 9,000 new volunteer mentors in participating states, and this year organizers have set a goal of recruiting 15,000 new mentors.

"As coaches, we have the opportunity to positively influence the lives of our athletes both on and off of the field," Stoops said. "However, more and more youth are in need of a positive role model. The National Mentoring Partnership has identified 15 million children in our nation who are in need of caring and quality mentors."

"In an effort to help close this 'mentoring gap,' we are joining the Coaches' Mentoring Challenge to encourage our fans to become mentors to local youth in need of positive adult influence in their lives," Gundy said.

In partnership with the Boren Mentoring Initiative, Stoops and Gundy are sending letters to college and high school football coaches throughout Oklahoma encouraging them to also endorse and support the mentoring campaign in their communities. The Boren Mentoring Initiative is also reaching out to its statewide network of mentoring partners to join the campaign to help recruit and place mentors. So far, 22 youth mentoring organizations have signed on and more are expected as the campaign gains momentum.

The Boren Mentoring Initiative has launched a website at www.okcoacheschallenge.org where people can sign up to mentor. The website also offers information for participating mentoring organizations as well as Oklahoma coaches who would like to register to join in the campaign. The site includes ideas and materials for promoting the campaign and recruiting mentors in communities across the state.

"We are grateful to Coach Gundy and Coach Stoops for supporting the Coaches' Mentoring Challenge and look forward to working with them, as well as other coaches, mentoring organizations and volunteers across the state to raise awareness and recruit more mentors," said Beverly Woodrome, director of the Boren Mentoring Initiative.

In a recent survey of Oklahoma mentoring organizations, the Boren Mentoring Initiative found that the greatest challenge facing mentoring organizations was a shortage of volunteer mentors, Woodrome added. "We need grassroots support from across the state to make this campaign a success for Oklahoma kids."

The Boren Mentoring Initiative, named for Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence founder and chairman David L. Boren and his wife, Molly, grew out of Boren's own commitment to mentoring and the proven impact that mentoring can have on a student's success in and out of the classroom. The initiative was launched in 2006 to promote the growth and development of quality youth mentoring programs statewide.

The initiative has created a directory of more than 100 mentoring partner organizations statewide and works with those organizations to seek volunteers, offer resources and promote mentoring best practices. The initiative encourages all Oklahoma mentoring programs to join its network free of charge.

The program provides consulting and resources for groups seeking to create new mentoring programs and also hosts Oklahoma Mentor Day at the Capitol, which honors outstanding mentors. Woodrome writes a blog, "The Oklahoma Mentor," which provides a searchable database of mentoring ideas and best practices.

Lower Deer Harvest In 2013-14 Seasons

Many factors combined during the 2013-14 deer hunting seasons to produce a total harvest decline of 18.4 percent from the 2012-13 seasons. Erik Bartholomew, big game biologist for the Wildlife Department, said the total deer harvest was 88,009. This compares to the 107,848 deer that were taken by hunters in 2012-13.

The deer harvest numbers from 2013-14 will be included in this year's Big Game Report, which will appear in the September/October issue of "Outdoor Oklahoma" magazine, published by the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation.

"It was a compounding of factors that contributed to an overall lower harvest," Bartholomew said.

Oklahoma offers three major types of deer hunting seasons: archery, muzzleloader and gun. Harvest numbers for each of those seasons declined from the previous year, based on data gathered from reports to Oklahoma's online E-Check system.

A total of 52,197 bucks (59.3 percent) and 35,812 (40.7 percent) does were harvested in 2013-14.

The largest decline was seen for the muzzleloader season. This year, muzzleloader hunters took 14,981 deer, which is down 6,624 animals (30.7 percent) from the muzzleloader harvest of 2012-13. The gun season harvest was 51,588, down 11,447 animals (18.2 percent), while archery hunters took 21,440 deer, down 1,768 deer (7.6 percent) this year from the previous year.

"We know that 2011 and 2012 were particularly bad recruitment years for reproduction due to widespread drought across the state," Bartholomew said. So, the deer population was likely lower overall ahead of the 2013-14 deer seasons. A comparatively mild and wet summer in 2013 produced more food and cover options heading into fall, which effectively distributed the deer population more throughout the landscape.

"The deer were less concentrated because food and water was more widely available as compared to previous years. In many parts of the state, there was a bumper acorn crop. So, it's no wonder that deer weren't visiting corn feeders or food plots," he said.

In most of the state, much denser foliage and taller grass growth brought on by milder and wetter conditions also hindered hunters' ability to sight deer in the field.

Bartholomew said the weather also played a part in reducing the deer harvest. The gun season was affected by two major winter storm events over its 16-day run, along with several days of heavy fog in many areas of the state. Significant winter weather also affected the opening few days of the holiday antlerless season.

The 2013-14 season was the first that required all deer hunters to report their harvests online using the Wildlife Department's E-Check system at wildlifedepartment.com.

The online E-Check system offers hunters a more convenient way to report their harvests of deer, elk and turkey. No longer are hunters required to travel to a physical check station during business hours to report their harvests.

E-Check aids biologists and game wardens, who can access current harvest information to help them better manage wildlife.
